FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents, Friends, Staff and Students of Caroline Chisholm College,

Last weekend we celebrated the Church's birthday - the great feast of Pentecost when the early disciples were filled with the Holy Spirit and he emboldened them to go out into the world. The disciples, huddled together in fear had two options. They could keep these gifts to themselves or share them with others. Each option would have very different possible consequences.

Option Number 1: They could keep it to themselves and not tell anyone. That certainly would have been the safer option. After all, Christians were persecuted at this time so wanting to share this amazing experience would put you in the spotlight and possibly result in your death or in the least, you would be ostracized or humiliated.

Had they chosen to keep this blessing from God to themselves, the Christian church would not have been anything more than a very small rather insignificant sect of Judaism - perhaps it would have died out in time as sects tend to do. No Catholicism, no Anglicanism, no Greek Orthodox, no Global Christian church, no Caritas and Project Compassion, no World Vision, no Salvation Army, no churches, no catholic schools ...

Instead they chose a different option. **Option Number 2:** They chose to come out of hiding to risk being known as Christians and wanting to live their lives as Christians and share the wonderful story of Jesus with others.

The Holy Spirit made them courageous. It made them active participants in the story of Jesus - not just passive onlookers. It made them appreciate just how amazing Jesus and the way he wanted them to live their life really was.

They displayed courage to use the gifts they had (and perhaps always had but had been afraid to use) to promote and celebrate something that was vital to them.

As a consequence the church was born.

In the fruits of the Holy Spirit: charity, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, generosity, gentleness, faithfulness, modesty, self-control and chastity we see what becomes of people who let themselves be completely formed by God. The fruits show that God really plays a real part in the life of Christians (Catholic Catechism No 311).

Just like the early disciples, we are challenged to be Christians not only in our words but also in our everyday actions.

FROM THE LEADER OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The Beatitudes.

*Blessed are the poor in spirit,
for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.*

*Blessed are they who mourn,
for they shall be comforted.*

*Blessed are the meek,
for they shall inherit the earth.*

*Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness,
for they shall be satisfied.*

*Blessed are the merciful,
for they shall obtain mercy.*

*Blessed are the pure of heart,
for they shall see God.*

*Blessed are the peacemakers,
for they shall be called children of God.*

*Blessed are they who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness,
for theirs is the kingdom of heaven."*

Gospel of St. Matthew 5:3-10

At the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus instructed his followers about a new way of living out the commandments given to Moses at Mt Sinai and used to develop a moral code for all Jews to follow. This reinterpretation spoke about the blessings that would follow if one was to live in a Christ-like way. Jesus' words continue to inspire us today. They challenge us to do more and to be more so that we may live with God for all eternity.

In Years 8, 9, 11 and 12 the Beatitudes have been explicitly taught this semester as part of our teaching and learning in the area of Religious Education. Year 8 have been examining the Beatitudes as part of the covenantal relationship Christians are encouraged to develop with God each and every day. One activity they were asked to do was to think of a famous or fictional character who exemplified one or more of the Beatitudes by researching and explaining how the person “lived” the Beatitude.

One group, who selected Caroline Chisholm as their famous person, wrote the following:

“Caroline Chisholm exemplifies the fourth Beatitude, the Thirst for Righteousness. Caroline Chisholm was an advocate and a 'guiding light' of hope for the emigrants who migrated to Australia through assisting them to obtain an education and by providing shelter and sustenance to those in need. She helped countless emigrants by assisting women who had no one to look after them and through other unconditional acts of kindness. Caroline Chisholm is an example of the fourth Beatitude, the Thirst for Righteousness, as she helped the emigrants who were dehumanised and considered minorities in moral and humane ways. Caroline Chisholm practised these acts out of a 'thirst for Righteousness' and justice for the emigrants. In conclusion, Caroline Chisholm exemplifies the fourth Beatitude, the Thirst for Righteousness.”

In Year 11 and 12 students have been examining the Beatitudes as sources for the key ethical teachings of Christianity. These teachings include:

- All life is sacred
- All life is a gift from God
- And as we are all created in God's image, all humans have an inalienable right to be treated with respect and dignity.

Year 9 students have been learning about the Beatitudes as one of the key sources a person uses in forming a moral conscience and being used as a practical guide to live a good Christian life.

In addition the Beatitudes form part of the teachings of Jesus Christ that are referred to in the Luminous Mysteries, **The Proclamation of the Kingdom**. All Religious Education classes are currently reciting the Rosary as our prayer for the month of May.

'LIVE BELOW THE LINE'

Imagine only having two dollars to spend on food each day. Imagine having to eat the exact meals every single day. Well, this is the harsh reality for many individuals living in extreme poverty.

The week between the 4th and 8th of May, **Miss Camilleri** led a group of 43 Year 11 and 12 students to complete 'Live Below The Line'. This is an initiative that helps to raise money and awareness for people living below the extreme poverty line.

We only had \$10 to spend on food for 5 days, which turned out to be a much harder task than we thought. Each of us took a trip to our local Aldi or Reject Shop in hope to find good deals in order to make the most out of our \$10. Buying our groceries was very difficult, but not as hard as living off that food for 5 days. Most of us ate the same food each day, as we couldn't afford to buy a variety of ingredients. It was very difficult completing this challenge as our bodies weren't used to eating such a 'basic diet'.

Completing this initiative was a real eye opener, and made each and every one of us so much more grateful for the things we have today. Our Caroline Chisholm College team raised over \$4800. This is a huge achievement and everyone should be very proud of themselves. This money will go towards education in disadvantaged countries. This involves training teachers, buying school supplies, building schools and providing scholarships for students.

Although this proved to be a demanding challenge, I'm sure we would all complete it again next year to encourage more people to get involved and increase awareness of this major issue. The challenge was very difficult for us and we only had to do it for a week. We cannot imagine living in poverty with no finish line in sight.
