Vaccinations

Vaccinations will be on Thursday 1 September for **Year 7** students. This is the third part of the HPV vaccine. Students who missed the diphtheria/tetanus/whooping cough or varicella (chickenpox) vaccine earlier in the year can get it then and those who missed the second HPV can get it on that day as well. For students getting their second HPV vaccination, parents will be informed by Western Area Health about how to get the third part later. It is important that students come to school on the Thursday, even if they are a little unwell, as long as they don't have a fever. If they are unwell (but not with a fever) it is possible for them to be brought to school for the vaccine then go home. Please contact the college in the

morning of the vaccinations if this is the case.

YEAR 9 JAPANESE EXCURSION TO THE TANKEN CENTRE

On Wednesday, 10th August, our Year 9 Japanese class spent an excellent day at the *Nihongo Tanken Centre*, located in the grounds of Kirawee High School.

The *Tanken Centre* is a traditional Japanese house where the staff run all of the activities speaking only in Japanese, supplementing their speech with gestures, demonstrations and humour to facilitate understanding. The emphasis is on learning while having fun and the students certainly responded well, especially to the antics of Taka Sensei.

During the day, the students completed a number of competitive challenges involving all of their communication skills – reading, writing, speaking and listening. The games were based on language structures they were familiar with and also introduced them to many features of a traditional Japanese house. Some lucky students got to try out a Japanese bed (*futon*) and we discovered some excellent acting skills during charades. Some games were also physically challenging and involved things like racing while trying to balance a paper balloon (*kami fusen*) on the palm of their hands.

Our students participated with enthusiasm and it was pleasing to see them overcome their fears to communicate well in Japanese. In addition, to all of the fun activities, they also enjoyed sitting in the glorious sunshine in the traditional garden (niwa) while eating a traditional lunch box (obento).
