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FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents, Friends, Staff and Students of Caroline Chisholm College,

You might have seen Madeline, her classmates and Miss Clavel, along with various Harry Potters, five (yes five) Steve Irwins, a Beetlejuice and Edward Scissor Hands among hundreds and hundreds of others. Classes were being taught by the heroes and villains from Star Wars (our very polite librarian was a protocol droid called C-3PO! and her offsider: R2D2). FROM THE ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL

SMS notifications of absence

Parents are reminded that they are sent SMS notifications if a student is not in homeroom. If you are not receiving these notices, please contact Student Services. Parents are also reminded that they can now send a message in reply to the text notification of the absence and it will count as a written explanation for the absence. This is a lot more convenient than sending letters which may get lost in transit or not handed it. Remember, that the SMS explanation of absence only works when replying to the SMS notification of a particular absence.

Uniforms – blazers and stockings

Just a reminder that it is compulsory for students to wear their blazer and stockings to and from school each day in Terms 2 and 3 or until otherwise advised. If the weather turns consistently warmer before the end of term, students will be notified that it will no longer be compulsory to wear the blazer to and from school.

Uniforms – skirt length

A few students who have had growth spurts really need to see about letting their skirts down or purchasing new skirts. All students whose skirts are not to the bottom of the knee need to do something about it over the holidays. As next term progresses, all students whose skirts are too short will get reminder notices with the expectation they do something about it immediately, whether it is getting a hem let down or purchasing a new skirt. As the same skirt is worn by all year groups, skirts can be purchased at any time during the year with the expectation that reasonable wear will be had from any purchase.

If a new skirt is needed, it makes sense to purchase it in Term 4 when there aren't quite so many demands on money as there are at the start of a year. Just make sure the new skirt has plenty of length to accommodate future growth. Given the time they spend in the skirts, the \$50 cost will be one of the more cost-efficient clothing purchases you make for your daughter.

Parents should also check that their daughters have college socks, as they can be worn again from the start of Term 4.

Way of Mercy

Pope Francis calls our church to celebrate God's mercy in a special way during this Jubilee year, mindful of the many areas of life where people hunger to experience God's grace. He says:

"Mercy is the very foundation of the Church's life. All of her pastoral activity should involve the tenderness she makes present to believers: nothing in the preaching and the actions of the church can be lacking in mercy. The Church's very credibility is seen in how she shows merciful and compassionate love."

At the recent Leaders Mass crosses were blessed by Fr Chris to be presented to all students at Caroline Chisholm College to remind them that in this Year of Mercy we are called to be the "Face Of Mercy".

The crosses that were blessed were distributed by the Caroline Chisholm student leaders to the Year 6 student leaders from Bethany Primary School as part of our celebration of the Way of Mercy signifying that they too are called to be the face of Mercy in the world and to lead this in their own school community.

Students at Caroline Chisholm College each received one of the wooden crosses during a prayer service conducted in their Religious Education Class. They were reminded that as we are all called to be people of faith in the world today. We are called to be people of Mercy ... to forgive others when they hurt us and cause us to feel upset or angry or hurt.



We are called to be the face of mercy to our family: to appreciate our parents and the great love they have for us. To love our siblings and extended family members ... the people who know us best and accept us for all our faults and failures. We are called to be the voice of mercy in what we say and do ... in how we speak about people and how we speak to people. We are called to be the hands and feet of Christ in the world today extending mercy to the thirsty, the hungry, the homeless, the sad and the lonely, to the sick, to the dying, to those who have died and the ones they have left behind that need our comfort and support. We are asked to visit the imprisoned. None of these things are easy.

No one said being a Christian was easy. We are called by God to be people of action ... "to love the Lord our God with all our heart, all our mind and all our strength" AND to "love our neighbour as yourself".

THE HILLS DANCE SPECTACULAR AND PDSSSC DANCE COMPETITION

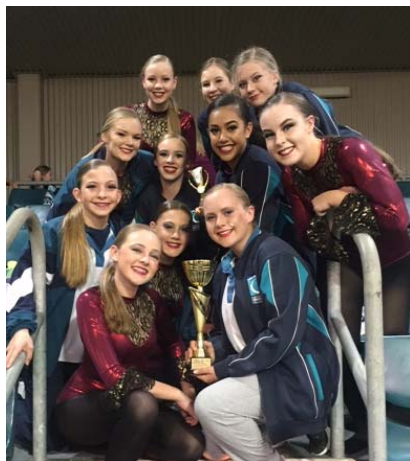

SCIENCE NEWS**The Scientific World of Gaming**

Mr Waldon showcased the video game “No Man’s Sky” in the Science rooms at lunch for science week. No Man’s Sky is a space exploration game with a strong focus on the science of planets and their environments. Within the game the player has the chance to roam different planets and harvest resources for their survival. The girls at Caroline Chisholm were able to travel between planets and move around the worlds they landed on to discover and learn about new animals, planets and ecosystems. Mr Waldon provided commentary about the development of the game and the science behind the worlds with a healthy hint of nerdy love for gaming."

Year 8 PBL

Year 8 has been working this term on a PBL on body systems. Students have been designing models on body systems using everyday materials and their imaginations. Their models have been designed in groups promoting teamwork and collaboration. Year 8 has been very enthusiastic in embracing model design. We are looking forward to their presentations next week when they will use their models to teach their peers about human body systems.

**Year 7 Wildlife spotters**

To celebrate science week Year 7 have been involved in a citizen science project called Wildlife Spotters. Citizen science is when members of the public collect and analyse data which can then be used by professional scientists. Year 7 students have been viewing images of Tasmanian nature reserves, far North Queensland, South-Central Victoria, Northern Territory arid zone, NSW coastal forests, and Central mallee lands of NSW. Automatic cameras have been set up in these areas to capture images of the wildlife during the day and night. The data provided by our Year 7 students to scientists will help research that aims to preserve Australia's iconic wildlife and support threatened species.





EDUCATION PERFECT WORLD SERIES CHAMPIONSHIPS

Students at Caroline Chisholm have been competing in the Education Perfect Science World Series. The competition involves students answering as many science questions as they can to gain points. This competition allows students to compete with school students across Australia and New Zealand but also has a hidden advantage as students are revising science whilst competing. YEAR 10 PDHPE EXCURSION

On the 18th August, Year 10 students went to the Bstreetsmart event which was held at Sydney Olympic Park. The entire day was focused on learning about the impact of dangerous driving for those who are both directly and indirectly involved in a crash, and aimed to influence teenagers into thinking about their actions when driving on the road. The day began with a Crash Scene Recreation, where we saw a live role play of a situation where two vehicles crashed because of someone's wrong decisions while driving (looking at a picture on a phone). This taught us to not only consider the physical consequences of a crash but also what can happen to passengers, other vehicles involved, family, bystanders and the restrictions which may be implemented on your future. After this recreation, two brain injury victims spoke to us about how they ended up in their situation, the recovery process they were required to go through and what it is like living with their injury in their life today.



The students were given the opportunity to take part in a circuit of a wide variety of interactive displays that circled the event. Some exhibits allowed us to test our knowledge of significant organs in the body and how they can be harmed by dangerous driving methods. Others were very positive and encouraged students to become involved and participate in circuits with students from other schools. There were engaging activities that required students to experience what it is like being affected by alcohol, through a pair of distorted goggles, and how this impacts coordination on the road. A popular station involved sitting in a wheelchair and attempting to use only arm muscles to manoeuvre a wheelchair. Many students were intrigued by the role that fire engines and ambulances played in an emergency situation, and we were able to look inside at all of the elements of these rescue vehicles. There were many other opportunities for students to enhance their perception of road safety, through fun and engaging activities. Some displays relating to youth trauma and safety at the event were Westmead Hospital's Emergency Department, Brain Injury Association, Donatelife NSW, Drink Drive Prevention Team, Red Cross and Wheelchair Sports NSW.



Before the end of the day, a motivational speaker, Heidi Haydon, encapsulated the audience with her inspirational story. Heidi is a motorbike crash survivor and bstreetsmart speaker. She is now a paraplegic and is in a wheelchair as a result of a motorbike accident. Heidi made the audience of students laugh, feel sorrow and have a deep concern and awareness for the responsibility that drivers have on the road. She explained how her life was changed because someone else took away her abilities to walk or sit up straight, because they had crashed into her while distracted by a mobile phone. It was a very emotional experience for the students of Caroline Chisholm College, who returned to school with a deep awareness and understanding of the need for safe driving.

A sincere thanks to all the teachers and PDHPE staff from the college who attended this excursion, because of the constant support they provided the students with on the day. It was a deeply motivating experience that we're sure will remain in our minds and influence our future decisions to act consciously when controlling a vehicle.
