



Dear Parents, Friends, Staff and Students of Caroline Chisholm College,



awareness for a range of local organisations and many other meaningful activities. So, when people automatically assume that adolescents are selfish and lazy I tell them 7300 hours.

Last week I had the pleasure of presenting awards to students in Year 11 who had achieved excellents in their learning in the preliminary HSC course. This was an opportunity for us as a college to say loud and clear what we value. I made the point in my remarks on that day that success and excellence are only ever the product of effort and commitment. It is important for all students to realise that anything worthwhile can only be achieved through the age old recipe of having a plan and doing the hard work. Students were recognised for being placed first in the course or in the top 10% of the course. Students were also recognised for achieving Principal's Awards and Gold Awards. These awards in particular are a celebration of those students whose teachers acknowledge that in every lesson every day they develop the habits of being good learners and demonstrate commitment to their studies and to this learning community. Congratulations to all of those award winners and I am looking forward to presenting similar awards at the presentation ceremonies for students in Years 7 to 10.

We are well into planning the learning agenda for Caroline Chisholm College for next year. Already, 2017 is promising to be a year of wonderful growth and development for the college. Our Pastoral Care Team and our Leaders of Learning are working hard on a new framework to guide us in supporting the well-being and growth of students. The main theme of these developments will be teaching students to identify their strengths as learners and using those strengths to maximise their learning. In order to support this, we have introduced a new lesson into the timetable which is dedicated to well-being, growth and becoming an effective learner. Your daughter's homeroom teacher will play an important role in delivering a program based on the principles of positive psychology. We believe that it is part of our role to teach students the skills to manage their own well-being by focusing on their strengths. Early next year we will invite you to a parent forum at which we will present the positive psychology model and discuss our new pastoral care framework with you.

In line with the principles of positive psychology, we will be improving our assessment program so that it shifts the focus away from performance to a more meaningful focus on the growth of each student. By being clear about what students need to do in order to improve, our assessment will become a continuous cycle of feedback that guides the student on her improvement journey. Rather than placing a great deal of emphasis on a few major assessment tasks through the year, the new assessment program will help students to realise that every step of their learning





journey is important, not just the product that they produce at the end. We will teach them to act on feedback and to plan for their own growth. In this way, we hope to address some of the concerns that parents have raised with us about their daughters' perfectionism. Over time, the learning culture of our students will become a much healthier journey towards individual success.

As we approach the Christmas season, and our Church enters the season of waiting, preparing and reflecting, let us call to mind those people for whom Christmas is not a happy, family time, due to illness, loss or poverty. **Mr Carozza** and our students will be delivering hampers to over 50 families in need over the coming weeks. This is just another example of the commitment to service at Caroline Chisholm College.

Finishing Times for Classes for 2016

- Year 11 will finish formal lessons and school for the year on Tuesday 13 December
- Year 10 will finish formal lessons and school for the year on Friday 9 December.
- Year 9 will finish formal lessons on Friday 9 December. All Year 9 will be undertaking Peer Support training on Monday 12 and Tuesday 13 December.
- Years 7 and 8 will finish formal lessons on Tuesday 13 December.

An alternate program will run for Years 7-9 on Wednesday 14 and Thursday 15 December. Friday 16 December is the optional Parent/Teacher/Student interviews and students only have to be at school for the interview, if an appointment has been made. The Google form to make a parent / teacher booking will be sent our to parents in the next few days.

Monday 19 and Tuesday 20 December are designated Staff Professional Learning days by the Catholic Education Office, Parramatta Diocese.

Details of the alternate program for Years 7-9 have been emailed to parents and carers. That email contained a link to a Google form for <u>all</u> parents of students in Years 7-9 to inform us as to their planned attendance on Wednesday 14 to Friday 16 December. <u>Each student</u> in Years 7-9 needs to have that form completed by a parent or carer, regardless of whether their parents intend them to attend or not attend those days. The form can be completed in seconds. It needs to be completed by <u>all</u> parents by Friday 2 December. The link to form can be found here:

Private Vehicle Conveyance (PVC) Subsidy Replaced by School Drive Subsidy

The NSW government offers a subsidy to parents or carers who have to drive their daughters to school or to a bus stop. The current scheme (the Private Vehicle Conveyance (PVC) Subsidy) is being phased out from the end of this year and replaced by the School Drive Subsidy. Our understanding is that parents already claiming the subsidy have been directly informed about it.

The scheme essentially provides a subsidy to drive a student to the school or the nearest public transport to the school where the school is more than 2 kms in a straight line from the house (or 2.9 km walking distance) AND the nearest public transport pick up (where available) is also more than 2 kms in a straight line from the house (or 2.9 km walking distance).

Uniforms

Please check over the holidays to make sure your daughter's uniform meets requirements. It is a strong expectation of the parent body of Caroline Chisholm College that uniform standards are maintained.

In particular, every girl must start the year with her skirt worn to the <u>bottom</u> of the knee. If this is not the case, please arrange for the hem to be taken down or a new skirt bought. Please check also that the skirts fit properly around the waist. Some girls have skirts which are too loose and their solution is to roll it at the top, making it a little tighter around the waist. The problem then is that a skirt which appears to be the right length when purchased becomes too short.

The normal uniform shop hours during the year are Tuesday 8.00 am to 11.30 am. If that time is not convenient, there are some alternatives for parents. Students can be measured for uniforms when the shop is open. Payment can then be made by phoning the uniform shop during its opening hours or phoning the reception at any time and quoting an invoice number from the uniform shop.

The uniform shop is also open during the week before school starts back from 9.00 am to 12.00 pm and 12.30 pm to 2.30 pm on Monday 23, Tuesday 24, Wednesday 25 and Friday 27 January. You might also like to check the availability of second-hand skirts. These (along with second-hand books) are sold privately through the college website. Follow the links to find details of available clothing and contact details for the sellers.

Shoes must be black, polishable, leather and lace-up. The college shoe expectation is that shoes

- must be black, lace-up, polishable and cover the top of the foot.
- must have heels or moulded soles (no flats) but of a reasonable height (no more than 3 cms)
- must be lace-up, not slip-on
- cannot be gym-style Converses or the like, even if they are black leather.

These expectations are for both uniform and WHS requirement. Please do not buy an expensive but incorrect pair of shoes as you will be required to purchase a new pair. If a store does not have the correct type, try a different store. Local shoe stores have been advised about Caroline Chisholm College shoe requirements. I would also advise not leaving it to the week before school starts as they are often in short supply by that time.

We are absolutely committed to maintaining the uniform standard. Given the warnings that have been made, both generally and individually, throughout this term there is no reason for a girl starting 2017 without the correct uniform. Students who do not have the correct uniform at the start of next year may be asked to remain at home until this is remedied.

Please assist us in starting the year with all girls in perfect uniform so we can present a strong and proud image of the college and allow staff to focus on the teaching of your daughters.



Imogen Van-Stolk (Year 8) is delighted to be joining Packemin Youth productions as a member of the senior ensemble alongside an exceptionally talented cast and crew. With a huge cast comprised of the cream of Australia's best young talent, and featuring Special Guest Star Simon Pryce (The Wiggles, Phantom of the Opera) as Old Deuteronomy/Bustopher Jones.

Composed by Andrew Lloyd Webber, **CATS** is based on *Old Possum's Book of Practical Cats* by T. S. Eliot. The musical tells the story of a tribe of cats called the Jellicles and the night they make what is known as *The Jellicle Choice* and decide which cat will ascend to the Heaviside Layer and come back to a new life. **CATS** introduced the song standard "Memory". 
HISTORY MASTERMIND COMPETITION

Tournament of Minds




