


Dear Parents, Friends, Staff and Students of Caroline Chisholm College,

The ANZAC legend, despite its violence, suffering and loss, is ultimately a story about love - not a soft fluffy love: but love that inspires service. Love that requires sacrifice. Love that puts others, and the entire nation, before individual needs. The ANZAC legend is ultimately a story of service - a belief that we owe an obligation to serve our community; that we don't get a free ride; that we must not assume other people will serve if we don't feel like it. A service that requires sacrificing my own desires so that other people can live and prosper.

When we attend an ANZAC service and see the old diggers with their medals, or, as many of our students who marched at Warragamba this ANZAC Day had the privilege of wearing the medals of a relative who served, we should ask ourselves: can I love and serve as these people have loved and served? In doing so, we can follow the example of Caroline Chisholm and draw closer to the mission given to us by Jesus Christ: to love one another as I have loved you.





Term 2 is well under way and Year 12, having returned from their half-yearly exams, are focusing on closing the gaps in their learning and completing their major works. I spoke to them on Monday morning and reminded them that there are no short cuts to success, they must work hard and struggle through the things they find difficult. As they say 'There is no elevator to success - you have to climb the stairs'!

I want to invite you again to join us for our Homework Forum on Monday May 9. This is an opportunity for you to listen to a brief

presentation from Mrs Jessica Austin, our counsellor and to join in conversation with our senior teachers to help you develop the skills you need to support your daughter with her learning at home. #### **Uniform in Term 2**

Thanks to all the girls who have been turning up so smartly in their blazers and stockings. They look very impressive and are wearing the uniform well. They are great ambassadors for the college in the local area. Students are expected to wear the blazer to and from school each day. They can wear a jumper under the blazer and can remove the blazer at school if they wish but it must be worn from leaving home to entering the school grounds and the opposite on the way home.

At this stage, all students who do not currently own a blazer should have made contact with their Year Leaders to sort out arrangements for purchasing one. Students who have not spoken to their Year Leader and are not wearing blazers will receive diary warnings for being out of uniform. The uniform shop is open Tuesdays from 8-11.30 am. Stockings can be purchased at any time from the student office for \$9.

Parents do not need to personally attend the uniform shop to purchase uniform items. A request can be made in an email to the uniform shop manager, Karen Chester, at <a href="kchester@parra.catholic.edu.au">kchester@parra.catholic.edu.au</a> at any time. Alternatively, parents can phone an order through to the uniform shop during its opening hours. Mrs Chester will arrange for fitting your daughter for the item (if required). Credit card payment can be made over the phone by calling during the opening hours on Tuesday morning. Simply phone the college and ask for the uniform shop.

An optional uniform item for cold weather is a scarf. Only navy scarves are to be worn with the uniform. Any simple navy scarf is acceptable. It is not acceptable to have scarves which are only predominantly navy or have a fancy texture or fluffy finish. They can also be purchased from the student office for \$10.

If a student is not able to wear a mandatory uniform item for some reason, she must have a parental note explaining the reason to avoid getting a diary warning. The plain navy scarf, however, is an **optional** uniform item which means it cannot be replaced with an alternative, even with a parental note.

Students who provide service to the college for a variety of reasons are eligible for a "Doing the Right Thing Award". During the last school holidays, Ms Wood and Mrs King were invited to speak at the international Clay Gulgong Triennale about student ceramic works and ceramic programs at Caroline Chisholm College. The Triennale is run over a week at Gulgong and attracts over 500 delegates from across the world. During the week, there are workshops, lectures, masterclasses and exhibitions by invited artists from Australia, United States, Japan, Spain, Italy, United Kingdom and New Zealand. We were invited to bring some student works that were exhibited for two days in the main registration area and attracted a great deal of attention and positive comments.

#### ZULUHA: A CELEBRATION OF LOFA COMMUNITY AND **CULTURE**

Over the past term, a group of 12 dedicated Visual Arts students from Year 10 and Year 11 have been working on a special project with Mrs King, Ms Wood and Ms Eyles on Wednesday afternoons. Caroline Chisholm College has been invited to work in partnership with Penrith Regional Gallery, Penrith City Council, Mamre House and the Liberian Lofa Community to produce artworks for a special exhibition to be opened on 28th May at the Gallery. The purpose of the exhibition is to celebrate the culture and stories of the Lofa community. Lofa is a region of the African country. Liberia and Mamre House has been working with members of this community, many of whom are refugees having fled war in their region of Liberia.

Our first step in the project was to visit Mamre House and meet members of the Lofa community, Justin and Wemor who talked about the foods they grow at Mamre House and the importance of these fresh foods for the health of their community. They showed us around the farm and invited us to sing a traditional Lofa song, Zuluha, which is about working together.

For our second session, we met artist Mehwish Iqbal who has recently exhibited at Blacktown Arts Centre as well as in a number of Australian and international sites. Mehwish's printmaking and textile works focuses on the

stories and memories from her homeland Pakistan as well as the strength of women to adapt and bring ideas and skills to new contexts. Her work was layered and complex and will provide the inspiration for our works.

We have now developed drypoint etchings of significant objects and plants connected with the farm and will now be printing the works and incorporating images and objects into the final works. We will be recording this in our blog shortly so watch this space.


